

Curriculum aims

Key Stage 3

English at Bottisham aims to inspire and develop the whole child, not only academically but also emotionally and morally. We use a range of diverse, engaging, and challenging whole texts to give our students an awareness of the rich knowledge and cultural capital which comes with reading. We begin Year 7 with an exploration of a modern gothic novel to continue to inspire and foster a love of reading, building on the work done at KS2. We continue Year 7 by exploring childhood experiences and poetry that explores place and identity to create independent thinkers who understand themselves, and the world they live in.

Building on this in Year 8, we introduce our students to the concepts of living in diverse societies by asking the big question 'Is Society Fair?' Using this literature as inspiration, we aim to develop our students' contextual awareness and enrich their perception of our ever-changing and diverse world. By the end of Year 8, we aim to cultivate young people who are articulate and able to express their ideas and opinions, both verbally and in their writing: qualities that are highly regarded in all careers. We also believe it is important to share a diverse range of texts and we strive for our students to see themselves reflected in the literature they study.

In Year 9, we continue to explore varied experiences and identities with an aim to further nurture empathy, perspective, and creativity. As part of a student's learning journey at Bottisham, we expose students to the power that vocabulary holds and explicitly aim to build the range of words students can use effectively to articulate their thoughts and ideas – both analytically and creatively.

Fundamentally, we aim for all our students to be inspired by English and grow as individuals, to foster life-long love of reading and be prepared for the world beyond secondary school.

English is for everyone and at BVC we place emphasis on ensuring our classes are inclusive and provide challenge and access for all. This is reflected in the extra-curricular opportunities we offer: creative writing, masterclasses, debating and linguistics.



Curriculum Content

Year 7

In year 7, most students have 7 lessons of English per fortnight, placed into broadly-set groups.

- Whole-Text Study: Gothic Literature *My Swordhand is Singing*
- Victorian Literature and Childhood: *Oliver Twist* and other texts
- Poetry from Other Cultures: *An exploration of place, identify and culture*

- Dystopian Fiction: *The Hunger Games* and other

- Shakespeare: Richard III
- Whole-Novel Exploration: Private Peaceful or The Graveyard Book



Curriculum Content Year 9

- Love, Loss and Tragedy: Romeo and Juliet and a range of sonnets
- Gothic Genre: A range of extracts exploring the Gothic genre across time
- Exploring narrative and structure: a collection of short stories.

Curriculum Delivery Key Stage 4

All students will sit 3 sets of mock examinations:

Year 10: March

Year 11: October & February

Final Examinations take place in June of Year 11.

Curriculum aims Key Stage 4

We fully recognise that the work one in KS4 English has a lasting effect on students' life chances, employability and opportunities.
